

Welfare Provision at Mary's

Student Support at Mary's

We have a range of people at Mary's who are dedicated to provide welfare provision for you if you have any concerns, whether that is academic, financial or personal. If you have any concerns at all then these are the people to contact. It is important to understand that it is not a sign of weakness if you need to ask for help or if you just need to chat to someone about an issue you might be facing.

Formal Student Support at Mary's is staff led and informal welfare advice can be sought from Welfare at Mary's (WAM) which is student led. See below for information about support options.

Staff led Student Support

The Mary's Student Support team can support you throughout your time at Durham, whether you live in or out. They can advise you on issues affecting your wellbeing and help you access other support services across the University. Your Department also has a Student Support Officer who can support you and help you engage and progress with your studies.

Our brilliant Assistant Principals, Dave Robson and Emma Gray (and her dog Twig!), will be your first port of call for student support within College, whether that be academic or personal. They are both truly wonderful, friendly people; Dave is an avid parkrun fan and Emma has her own smallholding which includes donkeys!

Our Student Support Administrator Jennifer Moss is also on hand to assist with welfare and financial concerns, working closely with Dave and Emma. All three will be available throughout your Freshers' Week to help you out with any concerns you may have.

College staff will be able to advise if they think you should seek further support, whether that is from the university or from GPs in the case of medical issues. There are also provisions in place from Nightline and the Samaritans if anyone needs any welfare support and does not want to come into College.

The new Durham University Student Support Hub provides additional support provision from across the University: <u>Student Support Hub</u>. In addition, a Student Support Portal is coming soon: you'll be able to use it to request support, book appointments and access resources.

WAM is our student welfare team and is here to do whatever they can to help anyone who may be struggling at university. Our Senior Welfare



Officers, Pip and Bee, sit on the executive committee, and the three assistant WAM Officers, Niamh, Saachi and Emily, sit on the ex-officio committee. You can meet them all on the website page which is linked above! WAM offers free welfare supplies, such as condoms and pregnancy tests and also runs drop-in sessions, as well as a series of campaigns throughout the year which target a wide range of topics. WAM will be able to provide guidance on a whole host of matters, from housing, to exam advice, to general wellbeing. You'll also have the opportunity to join the WAM Committee, where you'll have the chance to get involved with various campaigns over the year.

During your Freshers' Week, WAM will be running drop-in sessions and our amazing officers, Bee, Niamh, Saachi and Emily are all on the Frep team, so will be around to help you out at any time. Remember that it is important to take a night off and be mindful of yourself; whilst there will be lots of exciting activities on offer, there is no pressure to join in with absolutely everything or stay up late every night. Listen to your body, your mind and don't hesitate to reach out for support.

Safety


As part of our 'Safe Mary's' initiative, your safety is a top priority of college life. During your Induction Week, we'd encourage you to look out for your peers and yourself, and reach out to college support systems if you ever feel you need them.

The 'Safe Mary's' initiative supports:

- Responsible drinking
- Never walking home alone at night
- Always using well-lit routes
- Safe and consensual sex (you will all enrol in 'Consent Matters' training in your Induction Week)
- Not engaging in risky or undesired behaviours due to peer-pressure
- Keeping doors and windows locked.

Durham is a small city and therefore generally feels very safe; however, we'd recommend you take a screenshot of the map and keep it on your phone just in case you should ever need it throughout your time here.

The history of our college is fascinating. Mary's began as a women's



hostel in 1899 at a time when female education was rare and was granted with the status of a 'college' in 1919. Our current college building started being built in 1947 and the foundation stone

was laid by Princess Elizabeth.

Mary's is a traditional college with modern values, meaning we have retained regular gowned formals and black-tie events, but we are more relaxed than some other colleges.

Mary's is undoubtedly one of the most beautiful college in Durham; the vast grounds and the view of the Cathedral from the Terrace are second to none. Coupled with the convenient location right next to the Science Site, Bill Bryson Library, the new Teaching and Learning Centre and an easy walk into town, it is easy to see why

Things you'll soon become familiar with at Mary's

1. Formals

Traditional Dinners held in college 3 or 4 times a term; more on these later in the Events section!

2. Meals

If you are on a fully catered package you will receive 3 meals a day, 7 days a week (2 on Saturdays – brunch and dinner with a much smaller breakfast). If you are on a flexible dining plan you will find out that the food here is really good and there is always a variety of options; we have a couple of meat options and vegetarian/vegan options, sides, a salad bar, soup and fresh fruit available. The catering staff are absolutely lovely and super jokes, so make friends with them and they might even be able to slide you an extra portion or two. Meal times are also a great place to meet people when you first move into college try and sit with different groups at meal times if you want to meet someone new! You've already met Mustafa and JP in the 'Meet the Staff' section – they are the masterminds behind the kitchens, so chat to them if you have any dietary requirements as everyone can be accommodated for! The dining hall is definitely one of the main social hubs at Mary's and by the end of your first year you might well realise you have clocked up more hours in the Dining Hall than in any other place in Durham!

3. Sports and Societies

There are a huge variety of sports teams here at Mary's, ranging from football to rowing, badminton to croquet! We've really developed from not being a traditionally 'sporty' college to becoming a competitive force to be reckoned with. The brilliant thing about college sport is that you can be a complete beginner and still get involved as well as being committed as you want, if you only have time to go once every couple



of weeks that is okay! Also, please don't feel like it is a necessity to get involved with sport - we also have lots of amazing and wide-ranging societies, spanning from baking to board games to Eurovision! There'll be a list of all the sports and societies later on in this handbook.

4. Arts

Mary's Arts Society (branded as SMCAS) is an umbrella organisation encompassing many different societies such as Basement Jazz, Mary's Mixed Voices (MMV), Mary's Dance, Foot of the Hill Theatre Company and Chapel Choir. SMCAS prides itself on being an open and inclusive society, so even if you've never performed in a show before, picked up a paintbrush or danced in public, you'll still be able to get involved. One of the most fun things to get involved in is the Mary's Panto that takes place in December. The Arts Society also runs an Arts Week in February which culminates in a Masquerade Ball! 5. Mary's Bar

Mary's Bar is in the basement in the East Wing of the Fergusson building. Both alcoholic and non-alcoholic drinks are incredibly cheap. Just outside the bar we have two darts boards, which are free to use. Although we do get a bit of stick sometimes for having one of the smaller bars in the University, it is a really great and relaxed space; it would be a hard task to find another college bar where people feel comfortable going down to hang out in their pyjamas! We also have outdoor picnic tables on the SCR Lawn which makes for a great outside bar when the weather is good as well as the upstairs bar which allows for a greater capacity due to its location in the dining hall. At the bar we tend to host regular pub quizzes in the bar, which are always popular. The bar is at its best after a formal, when everyone heads to the bar and the building is filled with chatter and laughter.



The bar is staffed by students, and we will be on the lookout for new members of staff in the first few weeks of Michaelmas term, so watch out for that email. Working on the bar is great fun, a really good way to meet new people and provides an extra bit of cash — working on the bar in first year is especially good as it can literally be a couple minutes from your room! 6. The Toastie Bar and the Shop

Mary's had the first and original toastie bar in Durham, which offers the perfect late night snack from a menu of classics combinations or you can build your own. Like the bar, the toastie bar is staffed by students and again we will be looking for new members of staff in Michaelmas term. It's a lifesaver when the clock hits 9pm and you had dinner three hours ago! Toasties are either sweet or savoury, and one many would recommend is the S'mores toastie! Facilities

1. JCRs

As mentioned before, the JCR usually refers to the student body, but we do also have two physical Junior Common Rooms; one in Fergusson and one in Williamson. These are common rooms with TVs and Sofas for you to relax and have a chat in. The Fergusson JCR also has a table, pool table, Xbox 360 and Wii U. You can book out the JCRs for social events, watching films, drama rehearsals (the list goes on!) by contacting the JCR Vice President, Will. The Williamson JCR has recently been refurbished and now includes an air hockey table!

2. The Library and the Reading Room

The Library and Reading Room are open night and day using a key code which will be given to you at the start of Michaelmas term. The library is a place for silent work and is staffed by a team of student volunteers. The Reading Room is more relaxed, where you can do group work and has really nice sofas to relax on.

3. The Chapel

The chapel is found at the top of the North East Wing of the Fergusson building. It is a space for anyone to take time out for peace and quiet for meditation or wellbeing. One of the most beautiful chapels in the entire university, Evensong is sung here every other week by the Chapel Choir, led by the Chaplain Rev. Peter Kashouris. The chapel is not exclusively reserved for religious needs and we encourage those who are in need of a bit of peace and quiet, or just want to get away from everything for a few minutes, to come and enjoy the calm environment the chapel provides.

4. Music Rooms

We have three music rooms in the basement of the Fergusson building equipped with pianos, music stands and one has a drum kit. You can



sign keys out from Reception and play music any time between 9am and 11pm.

5. The Gym

Our gym has enough equipment to keep anyone busy and is being improved constantly by the dedicated Gym Reps. It has treadmills, cross trainers, rowing machines, a variety of resistance machines and a large range of free weights. You can find information about annual membership through the college website; it is one of the most affordable gyms in Durham and a great way to let off steam! All new student gym members will need to attend an induction session before they can use the gym and these will take place at the start of term.

6. Laundry Rooms

There are two main laundry rooms; one in Fergusson, one in Williamson with another in Teikyo. The washers and dryers are very easy to use and are on an automated system; you can download the **Circuit Laundry Plus** App to operate the machines. The washing machines can take huge loads and cost £4 per wash with free tumble drying. As well as washers and dryers, the laundry rooms also provide irons and ironing boards in case you need to iron a shirt for a formal or two! Note that if you need to use your own laundry detergent (rather than the detergent automatically dispensed) , there is one machine available in each laundry for this purpose.

7. Pantries

There is one pantry on every corridor and are kitted out with basic kitchen appliances such as kettles, microwaves, toasters and fridges. Please note that because pantries are stocked with kettles, microwaves and basic appliances, you are not allowed to bring your own for use in your bedroom due to fire regulations. Some may also have hobs and ovens, although, with meals provided during term time, this isn't something to worry about!



8. Multipurpose Court

We added walls around our tennis/netball/basketball court, meaning you can play all those sports as well as five-a-side football on it!

Events at Mary's

College is a key component of your social life at Durham and the social events are always a highlight of the year.

Formals

There are 3 or 4 every term, usually on a Tuesday or Thursday night. They feature a three-course dinner served in the Dining Hall and

students follow a dress code. which is lounge suits/cocktail dresses and gowns. The Principal and the Senior Common Room (SCR) sit on the Principal's High Table and everyone must



stand when they come in to start the meal. Formal rules dictate that everyone should refrain from using electronic devices and remain seated throughout the meal, but this rule is more relaxed in practice to allow for people to get up and go to the toilet between courses. Whilst the dinners are quite smart and you are expected to behave sensibly, they are genuinely so much fun and a great way to immerse yourself in the community. Formals are one of the great traditions of Mary's – not all colleges offer the opportunity to wear gowns.



Other Dining Events

In addition to college formals there are also some special themed dining nights throughout the year such as Burns' Night, Halloween and President's Guest Night.

Balls

There are three balls per year, one per term. There is always a drinks reception, a three course dinner and entertainment ('ents') afterwards, which can include anything from inflatable helter skelter rides,

photobooths, virtual reality games, and a surf simulator. In the past we've even had roller-skating rinks set up in college! There's also music throughout the night – with previous highlights including a Beyonce or Katy Perry tribute act, and of course the



phenomenal Durham student bands.

The first ball of the year is the black tie **Winter Ball**. The first ever Winter Ball was Narnia themed, with the whole college decorated to look like different locations from the much-loved books by C.S. Lewis. The most recent theme was the Winter Frost Fair! The second-term



ball is Masquerade Ball, run by SMCAS; previous themes have included Tim Burton. Venetian Masquerade and Myths and Legends. The final of the year ball Midsummer Ball after exams in third term.



which is the biggest event of the social calendar. Previous themes include A Midsummer Night's Dream, Lord of the Rings and Peter Pan. This runs from 6pm to 6am, with a meal in a marquee and ents running throughout the night, including fairground rides. One of the big traditions takes place at 4am when we all hit Observatory Hill to watch the sunrise, 5am is our hog roast and then at 6am we have the 'Survivors' Photo – it's always fun to see who lasts the whole night!

Mary's Day

Mary's Day is always on the last Sunday of third term and it is like an all-day festival, with music going from midday until 11pm, at which point people head to the last Sunday Night Klute (SNK) of the year. There are inflatables, food vans, the bars are open and we have Pimms, and it is just a really great celebration at the end of the year.

What is Durham Students' Union?

An introduction from the SU President:

The SU provides services to improve students' experience at Durham:

- Most of these are administrative, financial and structural support for student groups and societies. Some examples are Indian Soc, Hummus soc, Hill walking soc and DU Charity Fashion show - the largest of its kind in Europe. To join these or Team Durham, come to our freshers fair or use the sign-up forms on the website.
- We also provide spaces with study space, and a cafe & bar and TV in Dunelm House
- We have the only independent professional advice service for students in Durham - you can get pastoral support from your college student support, but if you need procedural advice on housing, academic hearings or student work the SU's advisor can advise you on your rights, and you can find info on our advice hub.

We campaign to tackle issues affecting students:

Through **confident**, **constructive challenge** we work to change things holding our members back, and we **unapologetically represent student interest at the highest level of the University and in government.** Some recent examples have been: lobbying with other SUs to successfully **change UK Law to ban universities from using Non-Disclosure Agreements** on students;



securing £6.6m of Durham Grant funding to help with living costs, and working with the University to design the distribution of this; working to secure an increase in study space across Durham. The main priorities for the SU for the next 5 years are to improve student housing, tackle the cost of learning, and improve induction for new students at Durham.

Freshers' Fair

All of the student groups, Team Durham, Durham Student Theatre, Music Durham and Student Community Action come together for two days during Freshers Week. The Freshers' Fair takes place at Maiden Castle, giving you the chance to see what activities you want to try your hand at. Different groups will be there on each day so make sure you come along each day to see what we have to offer. If you cannot make it on the day, you can still be able to buy memberships to Union groups online.

Essentials – Stuff to Bring

It's hard to know what to pack for what might be your first extended time away from home, so we've put together a list of things we'd recommend bringing up. Don't worry if you forget anything — Durham is host to a fair few supermarkets/stationery shops etc., so you'll be able to buy anything you need up here.

The Official Stuff

- Everything you need for work: paper, pens, books, folders, USB sticks, a laptop etc. you do not need to bring a printer, as we have them in college and there are lots in external University study spaces (although you might find it useful... and you may become everyone on your corridor's best friend if you do bring one).
 - Tuition fees letter.
 - NHS/GHIC card.
- Driving licence, passport, birth certificate you'll need at least one
 of these to register with the university! A digital copy of your
 passport would also be useful if you want to get a part-time job
 while you're here.
- National Insurance Number, p60 and p45 (if you have them). If you're looking to apply for a job, you will need your passport.
- Your chequebook. This is not a necessity, but some university clubs and societies will ask you to pay for membership via cheque

 most (if not all) accept online transfer or cash now, but it is a good idea to bring one just in case!

Stuff for your room

 Pictures/posters/decorations from home to make your room unique. If you're living in Fergusson or Teikyo, make sure you use white tack as blu tack/sticky tape isn't allowed. If you're



living in Williamson, posters and notices are not allowed on the walls.

- Bed linen college doesn't officially provide you with bedding, so you'll need your own sheets, pillows, duvet and covers.
 However, you can order a bedlinen pack if you want one from college.
- Towels.
- Bedside lamp.
- Alarm clock at least try and make your 9ams!
- Some mugs and basic cutlery.
- An extension lead.
- A clothes horse/hanger/airer the washing machines do provide free dying, but some people prefer to air dry clothes.
- Laundry basket.
- A bath mat (if you're lucky enough to end up with an en suite).
- Coat hangers.
- A shower caddy to carry shower gel etc to the bathrooms
- Flip flops or sliders to walk to bathrooms
- Slippers or fluffy socks to keep your feet cosy!

Anything else you might want to make your room feel more homely speakers, cushions, blankets etc. – but please note that the burning of incense and candles in rooms is not allowed (it sets off the fire alarm).

*PLEASE NOTE: You cannot bring any kitchen appliances to college, all is provided in your pantries.

Clothing

 White shirt/blouse and black trousers/skirt for college photo, matriculation and other formal events. Those who wish to wear a suit may also want to bring a tie. It is customary to wear a tie with a suit for dining events. Your smart wear will come in



- handy, because there are a plethora of events that will be taking place in the first term, that you can wear your best to!
- Ball gowns, dresses and lounge suits for formals and other black-tie events. Dinner jackets and bow ties will also be needed. If you do not own dinner jackets, they can be hired from Woven in the town centre.
- Sports gear.
- Fancy dress (and you'll need a solid stock)
- Wellies these might seem unnecessary now, but come November a couple of years ago, Durham was completely snowed out and we were ankle-deep in snow. It also gets very, very, very cold up here in winter, so make sure you bring warm clothes.

Additional Essentials for International Students

Alongside the above list of items, international students should also consider bringing:

- A bank draft/cheque (payable in British pounds) from your country to set up a bank account in the UK.
- All immigration and health documents.
- A few passport sized pictures of yourself for your railcard if you choose to get one or if you are interested in obtaining a UK Driving License.
- Food that reminds you of home (don't worry too much about it as there are quite a few specialist supermarkets in Newcastle, and a handful in Durham, but if you do decide to bring food, check first that it's okay to bring into the UK).
- Adapters to convert to a UK three-legged pin.



Things NOT to bring

It's natural to want to be as prepared as you can before coming to university. However, as international students, many of you will be struggling to adhere to the airline weight restrictions. So, we've also given a list of things that you can easily buy in and around Durham once you get here. We'll be taking you for tours around town, as well as on a shopping tour to Newcastle during International Induction.

- Bulky clothes do bring your favourite clothes, but if you're lacking thick and bulky clothes, you would be glad to know that you can get everything you need in Durham! Durham has a Mountain Warehouse, Superdry and several other shops if you would like to purchase warm clothes suitable for North-East weather. We also have H&M and New Look here for basics. A warm coat, jumpers and good boots are all essentials!
- Toiletries don't worry about trying to stock up toiletries for the entire term in your suitcase. Durham has Boots, Superdrug and other shops that provide cheap toiletries.
- Stationery can be bought at local shops like Rymans or WHSmiths.
- Candles/incense these are not permitted in college. You can, however, buy fairy lights or battery-powered 'fake' candles.
- Crockery having mugs, cups and cutlery is important but these can be easily found in either Durham or Newcastle.
- Clothing racks/extension cords/bookstands these can be bought either in the Market Place or around Durham/Newcastle.



The Colleges

The colleges can be split (largely) into Hill colleges and Bailey Colleges.

The Hill

Mary's – the best and friendliest college in Durham. Fact. Mary's was the third college established as part of Durham University and the last college to admit both men and women as students until 2005.

Fun fact: Princess Elizabeth laid the foundation stone of the Fergusson building at the current site for St Mary's College in 1947.

Grey – is one of the larger colleges and is close to Mary's, being situated across South Road.

Fun fact: Grey claim that they have the largest TV across Durham Uni. Legend has it that Hatfield tried to one up them, so they went and bought an even bigger one.

Collingwood – known as the sporty college, Collingwood holds the title of largest college by student body. They have also had their JCR and bar refurbished and it's pretty cool.

Fun fact: CCAFC is the largest amateur football club in Europe (they believe), with 14 men's teams and 2 women's teams.

Trevelyan (a.k.a. Trev's) – our nearest neighbour and local rival, Trev's students live in a maze of identical hexagonal buildings. Keep your eyes out for the annual Mary's vs. Trev's Varsity event in third term. Fun fact: Trev's was originally an all-female college and was the last all-female college to open in England, however it became fully mixed in 1992.

Van Mildert (a.k.a. Mildert) – Mildert have their own lake (a.k.a. the swamp. Fun fact: They were the first college with a female Principal, first with a female Senior Tutor, first with a female JCR President and first to become a mixed college.



St. Aidan's (a.k.a. Aidan's) – Aidan's is up a seemingly endless flight of stairs. Their Summer Fest is always a highlight of third term and is open to anyone. Fun fact: The Aidan's motto of "upon sure foundations" (translated into English from Latin) is supposedly a dig at Mildert for sinking into their swamp.

Josephine Butler (a.k.a. Butler) – Butler has lovely accommodation and is fully self-catered. This is our Principal, Adrian's, old college! Butler also sometimes gets called JoBo but don't call it that around Adrian he really doesn't like it!

Fun fact: If you look out of the Cathedral Tower, Butler appears invisible because they tactically put grass on their roof to not ruin the view.

Stephenson (a.k.a. Stevo) – Stevo again offers lovely accommodation and is fully self-catered.

Fun fact: Their college motto translates into English as "one day I shall astonish the world", which George Stephenson (who their college is named after) wrote to a contemporary before he invented the steam engine.

South College (a.k.a South) – The newest college to join the University, it is located at the very top of the hill opposite Butler.

Fun Fact: Before South was officially named, the student newspaper tricked many students into thinking that the new name for this college would be 'Vine' College, after Durham alumni Jeremy Vine. Turns out, it was April Fool's Day.

John Snow (a.k.a Snow) – after being moved (alongside Stevo) to Durham City from Queen's Campus in Stockton-on-Tees, they were temporarily located in the Viaduct and have now moved permanently move to Mount Oswald (near South). Fun fact: Their mascot used to be a snowman, but he melted on the journey from Stockton, so they changed it to a snow leopard, both called Snowy.



The Bailey

University College (a.k.a. Castle) – the oldest college in Durham with a fab bar called the Undie. It's literally in the Castle, so it's no wonder that the college is so oversubscribed.

Fun fact: Construction of the Castle began in 1071, making it the oldest building in use at any University in the world. Also, the Undercroft Bar used to be the Castle's wine cellar.

Hatfield – the second oldest college, Hatfield is very close to the Cathedral.

Fun fact: The college's founder, David Melville, pioneered the idea of furnished and catered residences with fees set in advance for students, which would later evolve to the now general practice of student residences.

- **St. Cuthbert's Society (a.k.a Cuth's)** not technically a college, but there's not really any day-to-day difference. They have two sites, one on the Bailey and one in Parsons Field, with two separate bars at each site. Fun fact: Cuth's have a JCR position called the Orbiting Professor of Martian Anthropology, whose job it is to circle the battle of the exec (an inflatable battle on the river that's no longer allowed) in a dingey and read Shakespearean sonnets. Traditionally, this position goes straight to the shortest person in the room in the last meeting of the year.
- **St. Johns (a.k.a. Johns)** has the reputation of being the religious college, largely because John's is owned by the Church. Fun fact: Their mascot, Olav the alligator, is named after King Olav of Norway, as a group of John's students found a stuffed alligator in the

St. Chad's (a.k.a. Chad's) – very small in terms of student body, but their bar is surprisingly large and has a sizeable quad with a glass roof conservatory. Fun fact: Chad's may be the smallest college, but their

JCR President claims that they have the cheapest pints across any college.

river and took it to see the king when he visited Durham.



And the rest

St. Hild and St. Bede (a.k.a. Hild Bede) – not on the Hill or the Bailey, instead out towards Gilesgate. Hild Bede used to have a fully functioning cinema that sells tickets available to anyone to see the semi-latest big films. A big refurbishment project is happening at Hild Bede for the next few years where the plan is to separate Hild and Bede again (they were once two individual colleges).

Fun fact: Hild Bede houses the only student cinema in Durham, Bede Film Society. The society was started over fifty years ago, showing films on a 16mm projector.

Ustinov – a postgraduate only college situated near Neville's Cross. Fun fact: Ustinov started as a postgraduate society and then turned out as a college. Their GCR President also claims that they have the smallest mascot in Durham, which is a platypus.



Durham Life

This is a section to introduce you briefly to some aspects of Durham life both in and out of college. We'll start with the glossary of some Durham student slang – though you'll soon pick it up.

Your Durham Dictionary

Billy B – an affectionate term for the Bill Bryson Library, the main university library and just across the road from Mary's.

College Parents – you will each have 'parents' assigned to you from 2^{nd} , 3^{rd} or 4^{th} year. You are matched up with your college parents primarily based on subjects, then secondarily based on interests.

Durham Students' Union (DSU) – you've already read a bit about the services that the SU offers. The most apparent feature of the SU is Dunelm House, in which the SU is based – it's a massive block of concrete by the river. Unbelievably, the architect who designed the Sydney Opera House supervised the team for the building and he himself designed Kingsgate Bridge, which is meant to be in the shape of the shadow of the Cathedral.

Fergusson (Fergie), Williamson (Willie), Teikyo, Northeast, Shepherd's Wing (Shep's) & Boughton – the six areas of accommodation that make up Mary's.

Hill/Bailey – the Hill refers to a college anywhere past the library (on the hill, as the name suggests). Mary's is the closest hill college to town. The Bailey is the old street which stretches from the centre of town, where most other colleges are located. Bailey colleges tend to be older and smaller.

Socials – depending on the club or society, these happen between a few times a term and every week. Each college and university sports team or society will have a designated Social Secretary, whose responsibility it is to organise socials.

Stash – any clothing with a college or university crest on it; usually every college/club/society organises their own personalised stash. Be careful though, purchasing varieties of stash can become addictive!

Durham City

Durham is a fantastic city and will be just as important to your time at university as your department and college. To help you settle in, here are a few highlights to look for in Durham. Feel free to speak to any of the Freps or Exec about where they'd recommend — everyone will have somewhere different they prefer to spend their time!

Durham by Day

The Cathedral is magnificent and very much part of your university life – you begin and end your university career here, with matriculation and graduation respectively. There's an amazing view to be had from the tower over the city, however it is seen as bad luck to climb the tower before you've graduated. Also, scenes from Harry Potter were filmed inside the Cathedral.

Market Square is the centre of town and many of the shops and cafés are centred around it. The indoor market is also not to be missed, with stalls stocking a variety of groceries, clothes, stationery and accessories.

Walks – you will never be short of a nice route to walk/jog along; you can walk ten minutes down a public footpath and suddenly feel as if you've left Durham City altogether.

Cafés

Pretty much every other building in Durham seems to be a coffee shop, so you shouldn't have any trouble finding your favourite. As well as the chains, there are some lovely independent cafés, including **Flat White**, **Leonards**, **Riverview Kitchen**, **Treats**, **Cafédral**, **Chapters** and **Vennels**.

Restaurants

In a nutshell, here are some of our favourite Durham restaurants!



- Italian restaurants: La Spaghettata (known as Spags, a Durham staple), Zizzi, Capriccio, Pizza Express, Bistro Italiano.
- Pub food: The Bishops Mill (a classic Spoons), Whitechurch (part of the Flat White family).
- Premium burgers: Tango and Fat Hippo everyone has a different opinion on which one of the two they prefer.
- Tapas: Gussto, Tapas Factory
- East Asian food: Nadon Thai, The Rabbit Hole, Sense, Thai River.
- **South Asian food**: Alishaan's, The Capitol, Spice Lounge, Shaheen's.
- **Fast food**: Subway, Bell's Fish and Chips, Stanton's, Paddy's Pizza (a Mary's staple on the way back from a night out).
- Middle Eastern food: Lebaneat (an all-round favourite), Akarsu.
- **Popular chains**: Nando's, Chiquito, Bill's, The Cosy Club, Zapatista Burrito Bar.
- Places to go when someone else is paying: Zen, The Cellar Door, Restaurant 17, Marco Pierre White Steakhouse.

Entertainment

We have the recently opened **Odeon Luxe Cinema**, located at the Riverwalk, which shows the biggest blockbusters. Also, every single seat in the cinema can recline and has triple leg room – what a dream. We also have the **Gala Cinema and Theatre**, with two screens showing the latest films at cheap prices.

Sir Thomas Allen Assembly Rooms Theatre is always showing Durham Student Theatre (DST) plays, operas and musicals. The shows here are of an incredibly high standard, with many productions going to the Edinburgh Fringe Festival every year.

Sports

Maiden Castle is the university sports centre and has been recently refurbished to provide even more facilities for you all. They have everything there, from indoor courts to Astroturf pitches, to a gym and a running track. They have fitness sessions throughout the year that everyone can sign up to. It's also a convenient 15-minute walk from college. Even if you



are not on a university sports team, this is a great place to get fit. There is a free 5km run from Maiden Castle (Parkrun) every Saturday at 9am, which is popular with both Mary's students and staff, in particular you can catch Mary's Running Club and Dave Robson on a Saturday taking part in park run!

The Racecourse is next to the river, opposite Hild Bede, and has two cricket and football pitches, as well as squash courts that are available to book for anyone. It is popular in the summer for picnics due to its picturesque location with a view of the Castle.

Freeman's Quay is Durham's local sports club. The pool tends to be a staple for those interested in swimming and if you take up DU Swimming you get a membership discount to Freeman's Quay! Many students choose to buy swim and gym memberships at Freeman's Quay due to the relatively cheap prices available.

Durham by Night

Pubs and Bars

College Bars are one of the unique features of Durham. Each college has their own bar, with their own drinks and personalities. You'll have to discover them throughout your time here!

You will be spoiled for choice for pubs in Durham! **The Swan and Three Cygnets** (or just 'The Swan') is an iconic institution for students and overspills with them in the summer term. A classic destination once you have finished your exams.

Cocktails are available in **Fabio's** (just above Spags), **The Boat Club** (five steps from Klute), **The Library** (don't worry, there are no books there) and **Revolution** (located on Framwellgate Bridge). **Ebony** is a champagne and cocktail bar and **Whiskey River** is a classic first date location, both of which



are slightly more expensive than the general pub/bar. Newly opened is **The Curious Mr Fox!**

Clubs

Klute is probably the most famous, or infamous, Durham club. It prides itself on its reputation as the worst nightclub in Europe (by default after the worst rated one burnt down) but remains popular with students. Home of cheesy pop, awful dance moves, questionable drinks and poor decisions. Fun fact is Dominic Cummings is still the registered director of Klute!

Jimmy Allen's (or just Jimmy's) features in most nights out and is home to the legendary 'Johnny Woodgate'. Also, entrance is free!

Bohemia (formerly Players) has only been around for a few years but has become one of the most popular clubs in Durham. Their big nights out happen on Mondays (Swingers) and Wednesdays (Players Wednesdays).

Wiff Waff has a big space with two floors and two bars. It offers beer pong, which is always a bonus to the night.

Osbournes, located next to Klute, hosts the most popular LGBT+ night in Durham every Monday. We're talking queues to get in at 6:30pm! Cheesy tunes and drag queens provided.

Babylon is a fairly recent addition to the clubbing scene but often hosts many themed club nights dedicated to certain artists and bands.
